Building On Better Outcomes

For thousands of people across America, access to radiology is a matter of life and death. Most of the time, life-changing diagnoses and treatments start with a radiological image. For too many people, however, access to radiology services presents a significant barrier to health and wellness.

To address this dire need, we launched the Radiology Health Equity Coalition (RHEC).

Our goal: To strengthen the ability of clinicians and radiologists to deliver care that follows the six aims of healthcare quality:

- Safe
- Effective
- TimelyEfficient
- Patient-centered
 Equitable

Just as important, we aim to make radiology services accessible for all, regardless of:

- Race and ethnicity
- Care setting
- Rurality
- Socioeconomic status

By joining forces, we can ensure that far fewer people will be at risk of becoming severely ill or dying from treatable or preventable diseases. Looking back at 2023, we are happy to report on the impact we're making.

RHEC forged partnerships with organizations on the ground to identify and reach underserved communities. We shared knowledge and research about improving health equity in radiology. We connected with influential academic and healthcare groups to amplify our mission even more.

And at 43 organizational members strong — up from nine at our inception — we're just getting started.

The Coalition in Action

The RHEC and its members focused on concerted advocacy efforts in 2023. Here are some highlights of what we've achieved:

 In May 2023, our Coalition partner the Maryland Radiological Society (MRS), working with MedChi (Maryland State Medical Society), LifeBridge Health and the Medical Imaging Technology Alliance (MITA), helped get legislation enacted that improves lung and breast cancer detection and diagnosis while making the process more affordable.

The new laws require state-regulated insurers to waive patient cost-shares for supplemental diagnostic imaging associated with lung and breast cancers. By July 2024, the Maryland Department of Health must assess current patient awareness campaigns and make recommendations for combating health disparities in cancer screening and care, with an emphasis on traditionally underserved communities.

• RHEC, in partnership with the Radiological Society of Connecticut, addressed the Connecticut General Assembly on the issue of enhancing access and equity for patients with disabilities. We continue our hard work in this important area.





Advancing Awareness for Cancer Screenings

Cancer screening often doesn't reach underserved communities. Last year, we stepped up efforts to create awareness and increase participation in screening to improve outcomes for patients experiencing geographic, racial and economic disparities.

Some of our initiatives for 2023 include:

- PSA campaigns:
 - Lung Cancer Screening Public Service Announcements (PSAs): During the first four weeks of a five-month lung cancer screening campaign for underrepresented communities, radio PSAs aired 1,211 times across 146 stations, reaching an audience of 37 million. The advertising value of a free PSA audience equaled nearly \$250,000
 - Mammography Saves Lives PSAs: During the first nine weeks of a threemonth mammography screening campaign for underrepresented communities, radio PSAs reached 156 million listeners. This included free and paid airings across U.S. stations, valued at nearly \$300,000. Additionally, 402 bonus airings were secured through paid placements.
- The Coalition joined the American Cancer Society's <u>National Lung Cancer Roundtable</u> (NLCRT), aligning with around 170 organizations nationwide dedicated to proactive prevention, screening and early detection of lung cancer.
- <u>ACR® and the Coalition partnered</u> with the NLCRT and <u>GO2 for Lung Cancer (GO2)</u> for the second annual <u>National Lung Cancer Screening Day</u> ("National LCS Day") on Saturday, Nov. 11, 2023. This lifesaving event helps to screen more individuals and raise awareness about lung cancer screening.

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Joining Forces for Cancer Equity

Last year, the Harvey L. Neiman Health Policy Institute[®] (HPI) and RHEC teamed up to establish the Cancer Equity Atlas (CEA) project. The main goal was to reveal communities with disparities in cancer screening, treatment and outcomes, and to detect the local factors that cause barriers to equity. The data gathered will show where specific programs and policies can best improve access and equity in underserved or marginalized communities.

"The RHEC is instrumental in advising this project and identifying opportunities," said Elizabeth Rula, PhD, Executive Director of the HPI. "Having access to the expertise and network of the RHEC will help us raise awareness and engage stakeholders, including community leaders, health systems and policy makers, in recognizing and implementing solutions that make a difference."

HPI also landed critical support from Amazon Web Services (AWS) Health Equity Initiative, through which they can leverage the AWS resources for the project's success. AWS's \$40 million, three-year commitment is helping build the IT infrastructure to identify underserved targets for equitable policies and programs that lead to better health outcomes.

In 2024, the CEA will provide an interactive dashboard that generates insights about integrated healthcare and community data, leveraging HPI's vast healthcare data.

This spring, we are excited to release our first set of interactive maps that display how local social determinants of health relate to cancer disparities."

Providing Outreach That Connects

Fostering Leadership in Health Equity

For advancing healthcare equity in radiology, it's vital that we enable leaders to develop while serving in the initial phases of their professional journeys as residents, fellows and other roles. These emerging leaders bring fresh perspectives, innovative ideas and a deep commitment to addressing disparities in medical imaging.

We strive to support emerging leaders through:

- Advocacy and education
- Community engagement
- Long-term positive change

Mentoring Medical Students: With a PIER internship (Pipeline Initiative for the Enrichment of Radiology) through ACR, first-year medical students from minority backgrounds at institutions across the U.S. can explore a radiology specialty.

After a summer course introducing them to a subject, students complete research with a mentor, then have the opportunity to present their findings to the Radiology Radiation Oncology Section at the annual meeting of the National Medical Association in late July or early August.

Student scholars receive a stipend from PIER for their summer internship as well as continued mentorship and support leading up to their radiology residency application. 109 students have completed the internship since 2017.

Residents Lead in Communities Crushing Cancer (CCC): In November 2023, over 70 radiology residents from eight programs across Massachusetts engaged with patients, their families and community members about



Reaching Milestones With the Mobilization Team

Since our founding, the Coalition leveraged the expertise and core competencies of each member group.

Within that framework, our **Mobilization Team** has proved crucial for initiatives such as:

- Contributing funds.
- Approving Coalition frameworks.
- Defining operational plans.
- Identifying and approving Coalition strategy and goals.
- Seeking input from Coalition partners.

For 2023, Mobilization Team financial contributions alone totaled over \$120,000. These helped fund Coalition programs such as marketing and outreach projects, event opportunities, and educational resources.
